A READING

ADAPTED FROM JOHN DONNE'S MEDITATION XVIII IN DEVOTIONS UPON EMERGENT OCCASIONS.

The church is catholic, universal, so are all her actions; all that she does belongs to all. When she baptizes a child, that action concerns me; for that child is thereby connected to that body which is my head too and ingrafted into that body whereof I am a member. And when [the church] buries a person, that action concerns me. All [of humanity] is of one author, and is one volume; when one [person] dies, one chapter is not torn out of the book, but translated into a better language; and every chapter must be so translated. God employs several translators; some pieces are translated by age, some by sickness, some by war, some by justice; but [the Lord's] hand is in every translation, and [God's] hand shall bind up all our scattered leaves again for that library where every book shall lie open to one another. As therefore the bell that rings to a sermon calls not upon the preacher only but upon the congregation to come, so this bell calls us all...

No [one] is an island entire of itself; every[one] is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less, as well as if a promontory were, as well as if a manor of thy friend's or of thine own were. Any[one's] death diminishes me, because I am involved in [hu]mankind, and therefore never send to know from whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee.

ALLHALLOWTIDE HALLOWEEN + ALL SAINTS + ALL SOULS

WHAT IS ALLHALLOWTIDE?

Allhallowtide is the traditional name for the Christian liturgical season that occurs this time of year, dedicated to remembering those who have gone on before us in death. This season has been celebrated in the western Christian tradition since the 8th century from October 31st to November 2nd. This season incorporates All Hallow's Eve (Halloween), All Saints' Day, and All Soul's Day. Particularly for Christians in the British Isles, Allhallowtide brought together the commemoration of the saints and martyrs that the church has held since at least the 4th century, although at different times of the year, along with the regional indigenous harvest festival of Samhain and Germanic indigenous festivals commemorating the dead.

All Hallow's Eve is the night before All Saints' Day and historically included a variety of customs like ringing church bells for souls in purgatory, parading in the streets wearing black and ringing a bell to remind everyone to remember the dead, baking what were called soul cakes in remembrance of all the baptized dead, and carrying around lanterns made from turnips to ward off evil spirits (jack-o'-lanterns). In some contexts, people would dress up in costumes to avoid being recognized by any vengeful ghosts.

All Saints' Day, beginning that morning, is a feast day held to remember the saints and martyrs of the church. Different parts of the church celebrated in different ways, including through special worship services and the veneration of relics. Originally the adoration of the martyrs (which goes back to the 4th century) was celebrated around Easter or Pentecost and wasn't standardized to November 1st for the entire Western church until the 9th century by Pope Gregory IV. Prior to this, the celebrations were more regionally focused.

All Soul's Day extends the commemoration of the saints to all who have died in the faith. Its commemoration historically included visits to the gravesites of loved ones and prayer.

In the contemporary Anglican tradition, Allhallowtide includes Remembrance Sunday, the commemoration of those who served in the two World Wars which occurs on our Veteran's Day.

HOW DO PRESBYTERIANS UNDERSTAND ALLHALLOWTIDE?

While we as Presbyterians have not celebrated this season as much as our more liturgical siblings like the Roman Catholic Church have historically, we currently do celebrate All Saints' Day throughout our denomination. We bring together the focus on remembering the faithful departed of All Soul's into the commemoration of the saints in All Saints' as, in the Reformed tradition, we understand that *all* who are followers of Jesus Christ are the saints, not just the particular people the church has recognized as being special for one reason or another. While Halloween has become largely secular, many of its practices come directly from the Christian celebrations of the beginning of Allhallowtide, and some traditions, like our Trunk or Treating yesterday, are a direct descendant of that.

Our commemoration of All Saints and Souls today in worship is one where we remember those we have lost in our church and in our lives. We celebrate this morning the lives of all the saints, those known to the world, those known to us, and those known only to our God. Our celebration this morning remembers the great cloud of witnesses in every generation, including and especially those we lost in the past year.
