



Rick's Reflections

For the past several Sundays, our Gospel readings have been focused on Jesus' parables as recorded by Matthew. First, there was the parable of the sower, then the parable of the weeds and the wheat, and last week, a whole collection of parables: the mustard seed, the yeast, the pearl, the net. Jesus used these parables to teach his followers about his vision of the kingdom of God. He began each parable by saying, "The Kingdom of heaven is like..." and then proceeds to spin a short, simple tale, filled with memorable characters and striking action. Parables are a usually short fictitious story. Used to illustrate a moral attitude or a religious principle, parables sometimes read like a news story or a series of real events. Allegories are narratives similar to parables in providing an instructive example or lesson. Both of these literary styles may contain symbolic fictional figures, but more importantly, actions of truths or generalizations about the human existence. Listen to this story and see if it might be telling us something...

Do you remember as a kid the challenge of crossing a creek? Some may equate that challenge to a faith journey. We have learned by our upbringing, or Sunday School, or mentors, the way we should be, so we have the 'other side' of the creek in sight. We hop from rock to slippery rock and try to stay dry. Once we find ourselves on a stable rock, the question is, should we take the chance and jump to the next rock? Maybe we need to go sideways to get in a better

position for the next leap. But that doesn't seem right. "We need to be moving forward" not sideways, or even a bit backward. Perhaps that would give us a 'more advantageous' jump to the next rock to continue the forward progress. What if the next rock is slippery? Maybe it's not well balanced and will tip over once we land on it. That's where faith comes in. Listen to the guiding voice. Nothing in our Christian Education says that following the way of Jesus would be easy. Our faith journey does not have to be a straight line, more often than not, it is a zig-zag course, like crossing the creek. We may have gotten our feet wet a few times or made a splash or two, but with God's guidance and assistance, we have always been able to climb out, shake the water out of our eyes, and continue looking for another rock, or another opportunity to continue the journey.

We are living in a time of change, concern, fear, disillusionment, anxiety, uncertainty, uneasiness and any other adjective you want to use to describe our summer. There is the slippery rock of the pandemic and should we worship together, or not. There is changing course as we figure out new ways to do 'church'. There is the unbalanced rock of racial tension that can tip and throw everyone for a spill. In fact, it seems that where ever you look, the footing is unsure. That's where, once again, faith comes in. We need to listen to God's guiding voice. Sooner or later, we might hear it say, "Oh, come on, Just Jump!"




The book is available on Amazon. If you wish to participate in the study, you can order at your leisure, or let Joy know and she can order for you. There will be more detailed information in the September newsletter.

The summer of 2020 will not only be remembered for COVID-19 and all the ramifications of a pandemic on our lives, but also one of great transition for our presbytery. The major change this summer has been the sale of the presbytery office in Clemmons. The sale or lease of the property was one of the recommendations of the Dream Team in the restructuring of the presbytery, as a great cost-saving measure. The Implementation Team reported to the Council, which approved the sale of the property, with the closing being July 31st. The staff has already moved out of the offices. Our Transitional General Presbyter and the Office Administrator (Steve and Laurie Scott) are working out of their home. The Financial Administrator Renee Carter, and Administrative Assistant Peggy Trenchard have set up offices in Clemmons Presbyterian Church.

Another transition that will take place will be the retirement of Rev. Steve Scott, our Transitional General Presbyter. He will remain through the end of his contract which is at the end of August. We wish Steve well as he enters this new phase of his ministry. Continue to keep our presbytery and staff in your prayers as we make our way, not only through a pandemic, but also through major changes within the presbytery itself. We continue to pray for God's guidance in leading us to new and exciting opportunities.



Let's Talk About Race

The issue of race relations in our country goes back decades and even centuries. The summer of 2020, which began with the killing of George Floyd on Memorial Day, has brought these issues to the front burner in very real and vivid ways. As a church, we cannot avoid what's going on in the world around us and are called to respond as Christians during difficult times.

As we consider our response, we would like to offer a **Fall Book Study**, looking at Debby Irving's book ***Waking Up White and Finding Myself in the Story of Race***. This book study is tentatively scheduled to take place on Thursday evenings (either in person or virtually, depending on our situation at that time).

We begin our discussion with the understanding that we don't have all the answers, but with the understanding as well that to ignore what is happening in the world around us is to abdicate our responsibilities as citizens of the world and followers of Jesus Christ. Some tips on providing and sharing music during and after the pandemic



LOUISVILLE — *These ideas are offered for congregations as they navigate the return to public worship and seek to bridge online and in-person gatherings. These suggestions may need to be adapted for a particular context of ministry. They should be undertaken only insofar as local resources and current conditions allow.*

- Provide hymnals for each household or invite people to procure their own. Make use of these hymnals in online worship and encourage members to employ them for personal study, devotion, prayer, or in music making.
- Recruit choir members and other singers in the congregation to call or video chat other members and sing a favorite hymn for them, or record in advance and send by email. This may serve as an entrée for pastoral care, outreach or fellowship.
- When congregational singing is not possible, worshipers may read and pray the words of hymns in silence while they are interpreted on the organ, piano, or other instrument(s).
- Identify musicians who live in the same family or household and have been sheltering in place together and invite these persons to contribute collaborative video or audio recordings for online worship. When it is safe to gather outdoors or at a distance in the sanctuary, these persons may also present musical offerings in public worship.
- Select a hymn or song for the week, perhaps based on the biblical readings used in public worship or a season in the Christian year. Invite members to study, pray, sing, illustrate, or even memorize the selected hymn each week.
- Include meditations on hymn texts in sermons, educational offerings, church newsletters, social media posts and other avenues for formation and communication. Hymn texts are a valuable resource for theological reflection because they are often so memorable, evocative, concise and accessible in their articulation of the faith.
- Do what you can with what you have — and trust in God's grace. Try not to be anxious about keeping up with the most technologically adventurous or proficient congregations on the internet. Just glorify and enjoy God, worshiping and making music to the best of your ability at this time. Perhaps it was for times such as these that the psalmist exhorted us: "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the Earth" (Psalm 100:1)

UPDATED INSTRUCTIONS!



The past month or so has had us gathering to worship “virtually” using the Zoom video conferencing platform. It has been gratifying to see more and more of you joining us on Sunday mornings, but there were others who had some issues connecting. Hopefully these instructions can help get more of us together this Sunday.

If you are using a laptop or desktop computer, you can connect to a Zoom meeting on your web browser (Chrome, Safari, etc.). If you connect on a smartphone or tablet, you can also connect via a web browser, but it is easier to download the Zoom app from your App Store (it is free).

When your weekly e-newsletter is sent on Thursday or Friday morning, it will include a link to this Sunday’s service. **DON’T CLICK ON THE LINK UNTIL YOU ARE READY TO CONNECT ON SUNDAY MORNING!**

When you click on the link, it will send you either to your web browser or the Zoom app. If you get a pop-up question about permission to connect, just say yes.

You will first be sent to a “waiting room” for a brief time, until one of the hosts of the meeting will let you in. This is a security feature that we have added to help protect us from having folks that are up to no good getting in the meeting.

Once you are in the meeting, make sure that your video is on. Go to the bottom left corner of your screen (on a computer; tap the screen on a tablet or phone) and make sure there’s not a red line through the video camera icon.

If you are on a laptop or desktop, it’s better if you enter full screen mode.

You can also connect from a cell phone or land line. The phone-in number with the meeting ID number will be included in the email with the link.

One important note: if you phone in on a land line, there is no way to mute you, so all audio from your connection will be heard by everyone. Keep that in mind!

If you have any questions, please don’t hesitate to either email or text me. (Call the church if you don't have my number - I don’t want to put my phone # out for scammers to grab it!)

Another option for joining the service will be on Facebook Live - hopefully! There is a feature of Zoom which allows direct streaming from Zoom to Facebook live. We actually got this to work on April 26th, so hopefully the bugs have been ironed out and there will be this option as well.

If you want to learn more about Zoom, you can go to their website (www.zoom.us) where there are lots of tutorials, or just go to YouTube and search for Zoom tutorials.

And we remember that the church is not closed. The building is, but the people are the church and we will continue to gather in this way. It is such a wonderful thing to see everyone’s faces appear on my screen every Sunday. Join us!


