APCE is an acronym for the Association of Presbyterian Church Educators. The last two newsletters have given you a little introduction to the advance planning that is continuing as I prepare for my anticipated three-month sabbatical, May-June of 2020. The Sabbatical Support Group (Helen Brown, Ron Kimrey, Sandy Russell, and Tracey Troxler) have met several times and we are making good progress on completing the extensive Lily Grant application.

I am hopeful that we can get the Session's endorsement at the February meeting. I will then share more of my plans in the Sunday bulletin, as well as during a Moment for Mission during worship.

As a way of further keeping you informed, over the next few months, I will

share in this space the responses to one of the narrative questions that is included in the application. So, here's question #1, and the response:

## 1. Begin with a summary statement describing the overall character and purpose of the renewal program you are proposing.

I have always been fascinated with technology, and have tried to use technology where and when appropriate in my ministry. I often go back to the lyric from Tim Rice and Andrew Lloyd Webber's rock opera *Jesus Christ Superstar*, which says, *"If you'd come today you would have reached a whole nation. I truly believe that as we are called to tell our story, we have to be open and ready to tell our story in new and creative ways. That is where technology and the digital age comes in.

The world is not going to get less technological or less digital. Our task as people of faith is to use this technology to our advantage - to embrace it rather than shy away from it. And this is so much more than screens in worship or having a website or Facebook page. That's what I want to explore during this sabbatical time.

In an increasingly digital world, how can we share the Gospel message in new and creative ways in settings that are not as "plugged in"?

The above statement is my purpose. Serving a small, aging congregation - many of whom are not plugged into the digital world - how can I continue to serve and minister to this segment of the population, while still reaching out to those who are part of the digital world?

In addition, through a combination of study, reading, vacation, and international travel, this sabbatical would provide me an opportunity for rest, growth, learning about other cultures, adventure, and continuing education.



### A Little History of Valentine's Day

Every February 14, across the United States and in other places around the world, candy, flowers and gifts are exchanged between loved ones, all in the name of St. Valentine. But who is this mysterious saint, and where did these traditions come from? Find out about the history of this centuries-old holiday, from ancient Roman rituals to the customs of Victorian England.

### The Legend of St. Valentine

The history of Valentine's Day–and the story of its patron saint–is shrouded in mystery. We do know that February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and that St. Valentine's Day, as we know it today, contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition. But who was Saint Valentine, and how did he become associated with this ancient rite?

The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When



Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl–possibly his jailor's daughter–who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic and–most importantly–romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France.

Did you know? Approximately 150 million Valentine's Day cards are exchanged annually, making Valentine's Day the second most popular cardsending holiday after Christmas.

### Origins of Valentine's Day: A Pagan Festival in February

While some believe that Valentine's Day is celebrated in the middle of February to commemorate the anniversary of Valentine's death or burial–which probably occurred around A.D. 270–others claim that the Christian church may have decided to place St. Valentine's feast day in the middle of February in an effort to "Christianize" the pagan celebration of Lupercalia. Celebrated at the ides of

February, or February 15, Lupercalia was a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, as well as to the Roman founders Romulus and Remus.

To begin the festival, members of the Luperci, an order of Roman priests, would gather at a sacred cave where the infants Romulus and Remus, the founders of Rome, were believed to have been cared for by a she-wolf or lupa. The priests would sacrifice a goat, for fertility, and a dog, for purification. They would then strip the goat's hide into strips, dip them into the sacrificial blood and take to the streets, gently slapping both women and crop fields with the goat hide. Far from being fearful, Roman women welcomed the touch of the hides because it was believed to make them more fertile in the coming year. Later in the day, according to legend, all the young women in the city would place their names in a big urn. The city's bachelors would each choose a name and become paired for the year with his chosen woman. These matches often ended in marriage.


