I found a blog the other day which got me thinking about this dichotomy. The blog is part of the online publication *Relevant*, and this particular blog was entitled "*Deeper Lessons of March Madness.*" Here is an excerpt that I found interesting:

*"You know the moment in a basketball game when your team is down by a dozen or so points, but makes a run and brings it to within two? And then the crowd rises to its feet, loudly cheering, and the team gets a new bounce in its step, hitting a long three to take the lead? That moment, with the deafening noise and dispirited opponents losing control—is a moment when you can touch the glory, where you glimpse—dare I say it—the divine. You get goosebumps, you slap a stranger's hand, and you raise your voice to the rafters for the glory to continue.*

*In these moments I envision God smiling at us humans and thinking, they are feeling it in small doses. Unfortunately, many of us leave these sporting "highs" without thinking that maybe they point to something greater that surrounds us. What if sport really is a gift from God? What if the blessings of sport are only a fraction of*

*what is available to us? I think it probably saddens God when the good things in life—sports, natural beauty, art, etc—are cheapened and seen only as ends unto themselves; not as the signposts to a greater grace that exists in the world. And so we should not cheapen basketball by writing off its "trivial" place in the grand scheme of things. Instead we should realize that the small wonders and momentary blessings matter in life. Why? Because the existence of rays of light implies a vast sun, and if we ever want to comprehend something that vivid, we should start by taking the light in small doses, wherever we can find it."*

Yeah, I do enjoy college basketball and I enjoy this time of year as March Madness descends upon us. And maybe we can take away some lessons from the sport - winning/losing - grace in the face of adversity - sportsmanship, etc.

And though we may not think of sports as trivial, we must put it all into perspective. They are, after all, just games. In the grand scheme of things, their meaning doesn't reach great heights.

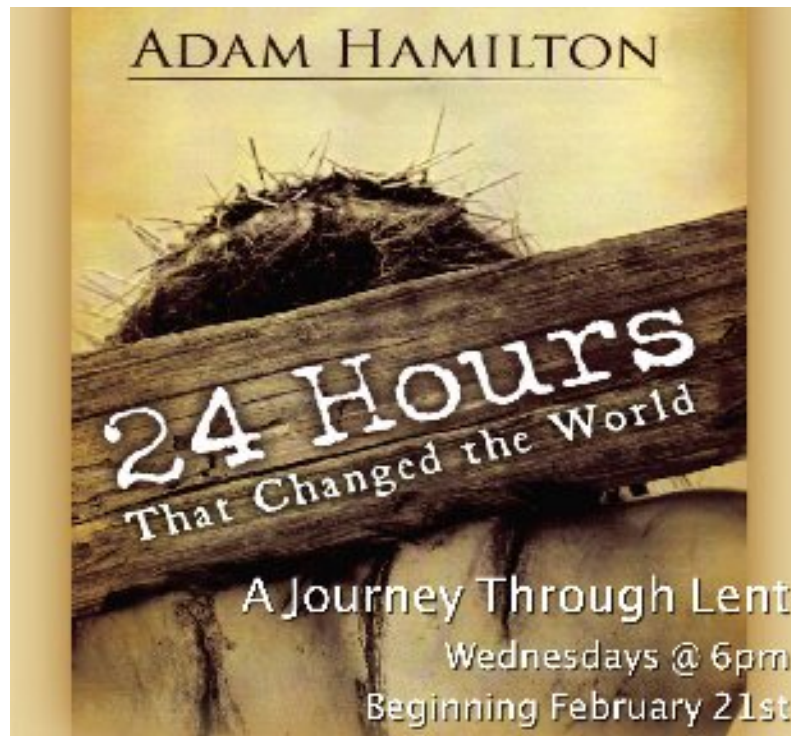
There are much more important matters to attend to, and they revolve around how we are to live our lives in response to the immense sacrifice that Christ has made for us. Talk about madness!

Once again our nation mourns for innocent lives lost in another senseless school shooting. On Wednesday, February 14th - Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day - seventeen students and faculty were gunned down at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

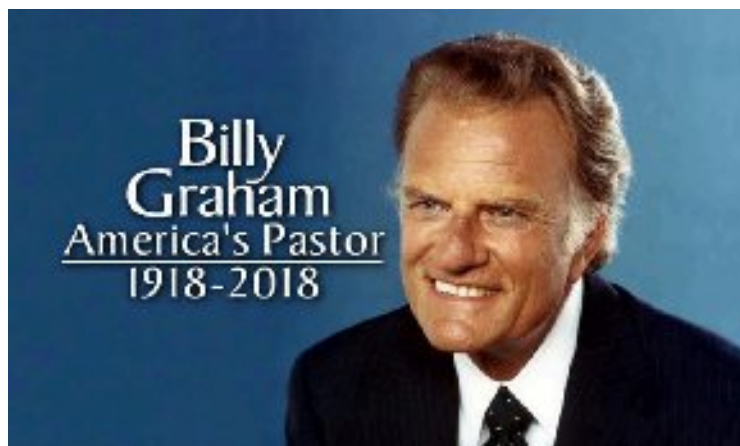
They have spoken at rallies and vigils. They have spoken in the offices of lawmakers in Tallahassee. They have

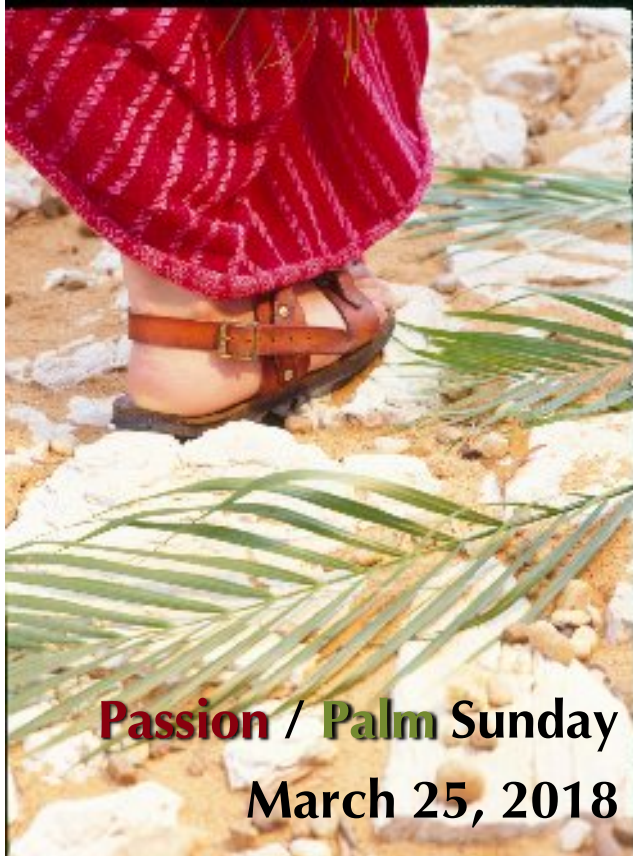
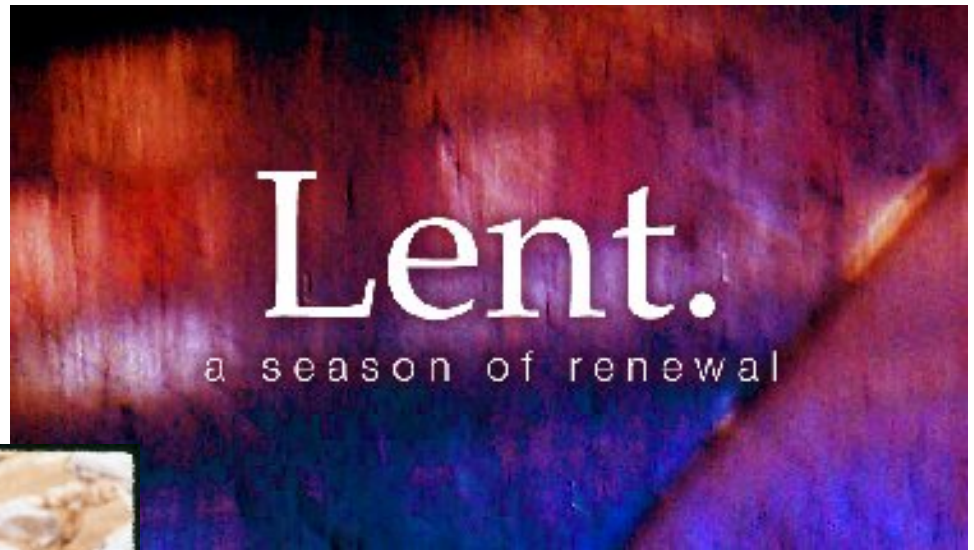
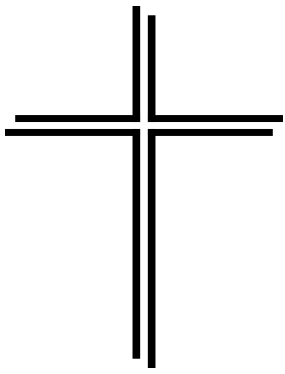

We pray for the families of those slain in Florida. We pray for the survivors who have been traumatized by what they have experienced and what they have seen. We pray for teachers and school administrators who must now deal with the aftermath of this tragedy. **The Session met for its regular monthly stated meeting on February 20th (postponed from February 13th due to illness). Here are some highlights:**

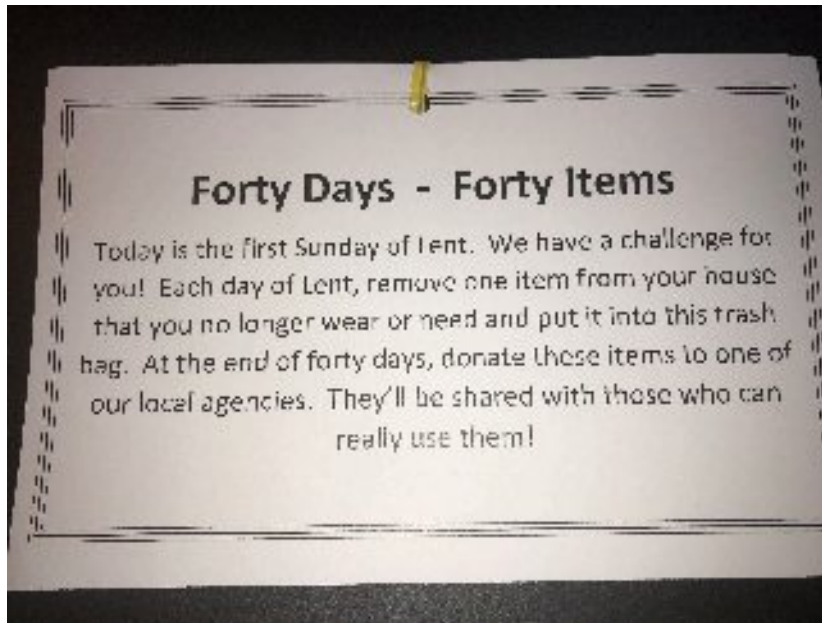
- Heard a devotion from Jean Payne

As the Session gathered for its January meeting on the 9th, one of the continuing topics of discussion was our financial situation. We do have much to be grateful for. We finished 2017 in the black. As you can see from the figures above, we have started 2018 on a very positive note (thanks to a large donation that was intended for 2017 but was posted in 2018, and also to a very positive stock market). But still, the outlook for 2018 is challenging, in that the amount pledged for 2018 does not fulfill all our budgetary requests and needs.

The Session, at its February meeting, passed the 2018 budget which does include a considerable deficit. The January figures, and a positive start to February will help. But the challenges remain. The Session will continue to monitor our financial health, and will re-visit the budget mid-year to determine necessary steps to insure our continued mission and ministry.

In the meantime, if you have the ability, and would like to amend your pledge, this can be done at any time and would be greatly appreciated. You can do this by either putting a note in Pam Hurt's box, or by calling her at the church (she is at the church on Tuesday afternoons).

Bethany has been blessed in the past with very generous donors. The challenge for 2018 is to continue their legacy as we move forward in faith, so that the mission and ministry of Bethany can continue.

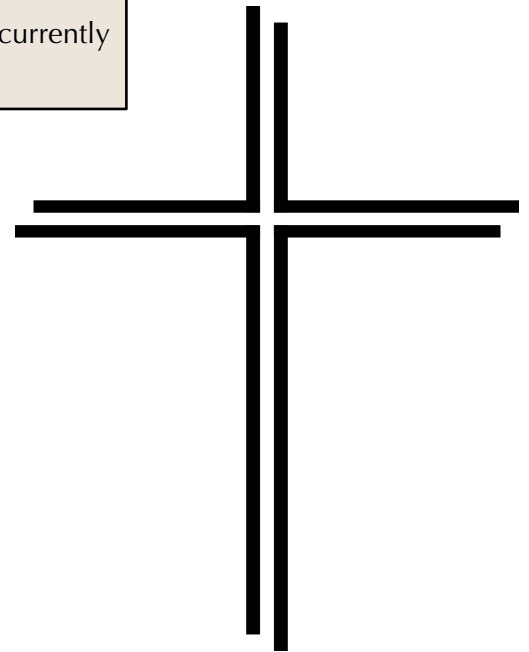

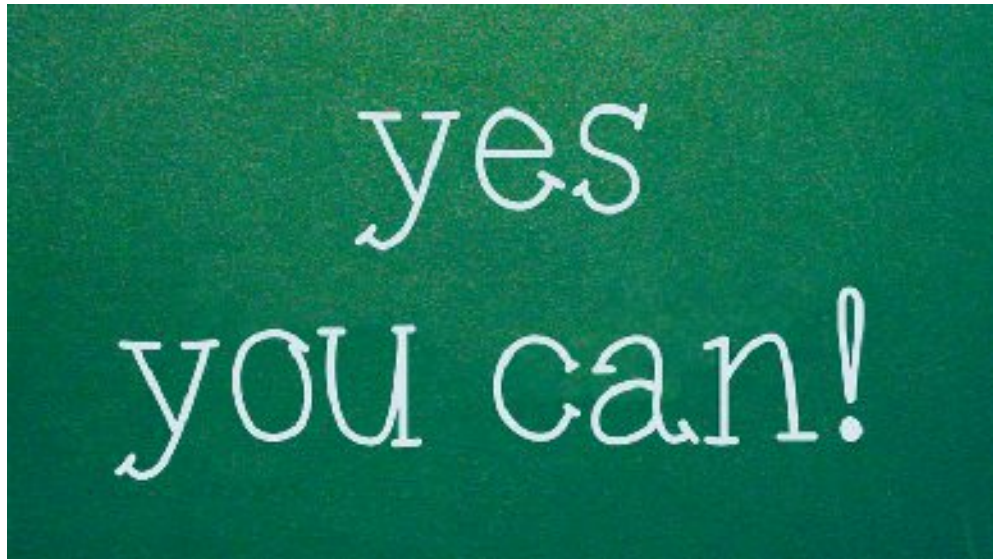
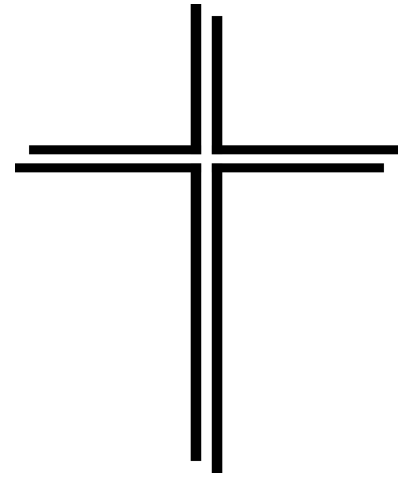
