My heart goes out however, to those who are not able to get out - those who don't feel safe outside their own homes. This is not a satisfying way to live. My heart goes out to students who are unable to be with their friends and are unable to experience school life as they are used to.
My heart goes out to teachers who have had to learn on the fly how to teach online, and who struggle to relate to their students on a personal level as they are used to.
My heart goes out to parents - who are having to be teachers and caregivers and husbands and wives and cooks and cleaners and play companions and employees or employers - all at the same time.
And watching news stories about all of this on TV can be depressing. So, for me, the solution has been to either re-watch some favorite series on Netflix or

Amazon Prime Video, or to explore shows I haven't watched that have been recommended by friends. I have found this to be very entertaining and it helps me escape just for a little bit, the reality that fills the airwaves almost all of the time.
I would encourage us all to not get sucked into the 24 -hour news channels. Whether it's CNN or Fox News or MSNBC or whatever - don't let the constant beat of bad news dominate your life. Watch a comedy that will make you laugh. Watch a drama that will make you think. Or just turn the TV off and read a book or take a walk.
I have been heartened to see some of the major networks' news shows highlighting some of the positive things that have been going on during this pandemic. Seeing the goodness in people and how people are reaching out and taking care of each other has been gratifying and helpful. We need some good news right now, and I'm glad that we are getting some of that.
It has been widely reported that when he was a little boy, Fred Rogers (who grew up to be the highly respected and much loved Mr. Rogers) would watch the news and be upset whenever there was a tragedy or something bad was going on. His mother would always tell him, "Look for the helpers." No matter what the situation - and we see this time and time again in our country and indeed across the world no matter what the situation, there will always be people who step up and go out of the way to be of help to their neighbors in need - or even strangers halfway around the world.
So, to keep our spirits up, look for the helpers. Look for those whose main goal is to think more about others than about their own needs. Look for those who put others above self. Those are the people to look up to and to emulate. Those are the stories that need to fill our airwaves.
We will get through this. Of that I am sure. Hang in there and take care of each other.

We offer prayers of thanks for the work they do to make our world a safer place to be.

## UPDATED INSTRUCTIONS!

The past month or so has had us gathering to worship "virtually" using the Zoom video conferencing platform. It has been gratifying to see more and more of you joining us on Sunday mornings, but there were others who had some issues connecting. Hopefully these instructions can help get more of us together this Sunday.

If you are using a laptop or desktop computer, you can connect to a Zoom meeting on your web browser (Chrome, Safari, etc.). If you connect on a smartphone or tablet, you can also connect via a web browser, but it is easier to download the Zoom app from your App Store (it is free).

When your weekly e-newsletter is sent on Thursday or Friday morning, it will include a link to this Sunday's service. DON'T CLICK ON THE LINK UNTIL YOU ARE READY TO CONNECT ON SUNDAY MORNING!

When you click on the link, it will send you either to your web browser or the Zoom app. If you get a pop-up question about permission to connect, just say yes.

You will first be sent to a "waiting room" for a brief time, until one of the hosts of the meeting will let you in. This is a security feature that we have added to help protect us from having folks that are up to no good getting in the meeting.

Once you are in the meeting, make sure that your video is on. Go to the bottom left corner of your screen (on a computer; tap the screen on a tablet or phone) and make sure there's not a red line through the video camera icon.

If you are on a laptop or desktop, it's better if you enter full screen mode.
You can also connect from a cell phone or land line. The phone-in number with the meeting ID number will be included in the email with the link.

One important note: if you phone in on a land line, there is no way to mute you, so all audio from your connection will be heard by everyone. Keep that in mind!

If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to either email or text me. (Call the church if you don't have my number - I don't want to put my phone \# out for scammers to grab it!)

Another option for joining the service will be on Facebook Live - hopefully! There is a feature of Zoom which allows direct streaming from Zoom to Facebook live. We actually got this to work on April 26 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, so hopefully the bugs have been ironed out and there will be this option as well.

If you want to learn more about Zoom, you can go to their website (www.zoom.us) where there are lots of tutorials, or just go to YouTube and search for Zoom tutorials.

And we remember that the church is not closed. The building is, but the people are the church and we will continue to gather in this way. It is such a wonderful thing to see everyone's faces appear on my screen every Sunday. Join us!

The transition to a new structure for Salem Presbytery continues, although with some adjustments and changes. The financial challenges of the presbytery have made it necessary to alter the timetable for hiring new staff and to revise the Dream Team's plan for the new structure.
Instead of proceeding to hire three presbyters on the staff, the plans now are to progress to hire the Administrative Presbyter with an adjusted job description to reflect the new realities that have arisen.
Other staff will also be hired over the next few months, including financial, communications, stewardship, and parish pastors.

stewardship for churches to apply for funds.

At the (virtual) Session meeting on April 14 th, Treasurer Glenn Patterson reported on his research into church's applying for a loan through the Payroll Protection Package of the stimulus package that had recently been passed by Congress and signed by the president. Unfortunately, the original offering of these funds ran out fairly soon after small business could apply. Churches are considered small businesses for this program.
Glenn attended a webinar presented by professionals who had spent a considerable amount of time reading the lengthy explanation of the program, and concluded that it would be good

We are fortunate here at Bethany that we can continue paying our staff as usual, and we are grateful for those who continue to maintain their pledges. But these funds would help in the event this crisis continues longer than we anticipate. So the Session unanimously approved the application for these funds and Glenn and our bookkeeper Pam Hurt will take appropriate steps to make application.
Although the money is called a loan, if the church/business does not lay off or fire any staff, the loan is forgiven and the funds are considered a grant. We anticipate making application during the second round of these funds being available - with no guarantee that we will receive anything. But we are hopeful.

Due to an increase in fees, we are transitioning to a new platform for online giving to the church. We believe this option will be easier to use, decrease fees that the church pays, and will increase our giving. This giving platform is sponsored by and run through The Presbyterian Foundation.
For those who are currently using our online giving on our website, you may continue to use that for the next little bit, but it will be disabled soon. Pam will be contacting those who are using it, to notify them of this action. The link to the new website is already on the home page of the website.
One added feature - also free - is the option of using an app on your smartphone. Just to go your app store and search for "GivePlus Church" and download it for free. You can then search for Bethany and follow the instructions.
