ohn's ournal

As you may or may not know, for the past two and a half years I have been privileged to have been serving on a General Assembly Special Committee. The

members of this committee are appointed by the Co-Moderators of the denomination, and are from all over the country - from Puerto Rico to California, and all spots in between. (It is interesting to note that two of the members of the committee are from right here in Alamance County - me, and Charlotte Allbright, who is the Educator at First Presbyterian in Burlington.)

The official name of our committee is The Special Committee to Study the Reformed Perspective of Christian Education in the 21st Century. I just call it The (Very) Special Committee!

Our charge included six tasks, that I have written about previously in this newsletter. The committee made several recommendations to the 2016 General Assembly - all of which passed. Due to time constraints, we were unable to complete our work and were granted an extension to report and make recommendations to the 2020 General Assembly meeting in Baltimore next summer.

The committee meets via video conference calls several times over the year, and I have just returned from a face-to-face meeting that took place in Montreat August 25th-28th. We will meet by video call over the next couple of months, and then meet again in person in January at Austin Seminary in Texas. The deadline for submitting the recommendations is mid-February, in order to be a part of the General Assembly's work in June.

There were three main areas that still needed our attention as we moved forward following the last assembly. One is educator certification. Our denomination offers a path for educators to be certified, and this is recognized in our Book of Order, and supported by presbyteries.

There are still issues surrounding the process for certification and our committee is continuing to try to address those issues in order to lift up educators who want to continue to grow and learn.

Another area that we were tasked to consider is the area of education within racial/ethnic congregations. This is an important issue that needs our attention, and the committee continues to work on this.

The area in which I was working (with a few others on the committee) was the area of education in smaller congregations. Part of our work included interviewing several people who would have knowledge of this area, and then pooling those interviews to see what common issues are at the forefront.

The people that I interviewed all agreed that the issues of aging and smaller congregations, and the challenge of competing with other options for children, were areas that certainly need to be addressed.

As we move forward toward making our recommendations, I am prayerful that all three of these important areas in the life of the church can be addressed in such a way that as we move forward in the 21st century, the vital area of faith formation will not be lost for a generation.

I covet your prayers as well, as this committee of dedicated and smart people tackle these important issues that are vital to the health of the church. I am hopeful that by our January meeting that we can have some substantive and workable recommendations to pass on to the General Assembly in June.

It has been a great summer here at Bethany, and I thoroughly enjoyed leading our Feasting on the Word series. I hope you all received much from it as well. And now I'm looking forward to our new book study (see page 3) beginning on September 9th.

As always, I am grateful to be your pastor.






Book Five: The Gospel Question


Book Six: The Church Question

Stewardship Season 2019 November 10, 17, & 24 ... sowing seeds healing hearts cheerful charity . . . "For God loves a cheerful giver."

Plans are underway for our **2019 Stewardship Season**, as your Generosity Team (Glenn Patterson, Jean Payne, Nancy Purcell, Rick Purcell, and John Johnson) have met to decide on dates for the campaign, and our theme. You can see from the above that our overall theme is *"Cheerful Giving"* - which is based on 2 Corinthians 9:5-7, which states:

"This is why I thought it was necessary to encourage the brothers to go to you ahead of time and arrange in advance the generous gift you have already promised. I want it to be a real gift from you. I don't want you to feel like you are being forced to give anything. What I mean is this: the one who sows a small number of seeds will also reap a small crop, and the one who sows a generous amount of seeds will also reap a generous crop. Everyone should give whatever they have decided in their heart. They shouldn't give with hesitation or because of pressure. God loves a cheerful giver."

-2 Corinthians 9:7

Beginning on **November 10th and continuing for three Sundays**, we will look at this passage in depth as we consider the future of Bethany for the coming year, and how we have been entrusted to be good stewards of this place and the many gifts we have been given.

The season will culminate on **Sunday, November 24th - Consecration Sunday - and our Celebration Luncheon**.

You will be hearing more about this over the next month or so, but please put these dates on your calendar as we celebrate our "cheerful giving"!

It has been a very hot summer - the hottest on record in many areas. July was recorded as the hottest July since records have been kept. Whether we acknowledge the problem of climate change or not, the fact that it's hot right now cannot be argued.

Fortunately, except for those who work outdoors, we have the comfort of air-conditioned buildings to make our day so much easier to handle. However, for many, working outdoors is the only option they have. For those who toil in the heat of the summer, sweltering under the unrelenting summer sun, the Stated Clerk of the Presbyterian Church (USA), Rev. J. Herbert Nelson (who preached at Bethany as part of our 125th Anniversary Celebration) offered the following prayer for farmers and farmworkers. But it could also be for any who work in the out-of-doors.



Extreme weather from violent tornadoes, heavy rain, and intense heat have put farm operations in a difficult place. Add the rising cost of maintaining a farm, the loss of land, and the effects of the U.S. trade dispute with China, and farmers are finding themselves in a difficult place.

The challenges of growing crops, coupled with the financial threat of losing their farms, have driven many farmers to take their own lives. Farmworkers and the rural communities that depend on a healthy farm economy also suffer.

The Reverend Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), has issued a prayer for farmers and their communities as they navigate a valley of uncertainty and despair.

God of all creation and all who produce food for our sustenance throughout the ages and around the globe, we give you thanks this day for the witness and the work of farmers and farmworkers. As your children face innumerable challenges and yet persevere, we are grateful for their persistence, skill, and wisdom. We recognize that without farming families and farming communities, we would have no food to nourish us. We confess that some of us are so far removed from the food we eat that we are less mindful than we should be of the troubles our sisters and brothers face and of the strength and courage they muster on a daily basis.

We know that you are present in all that farmers face—from loss of income and loss of family land to falling prices, extreme weather, and more. We acknowledge that our well-being is interconnected. Help us to commit ourselves to pray for and act on behalf of the health and well-being of farmers and rural communities, to embrace the great gifts that farmers and farmworkers bring to the world, to advocate for policies that will uplift and care for them, and to live our faith even in times of great distress. We pray this in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior. Amen.
