Friends,

It's a beautiful day in the neighborhood...

One of the most influential preachers of all time, in my opinion, was a pastor who is usually neither thought of as a preacher nor a pastor. And yet, he, the Reverend Fred Rogers, known to most of us around the world as Mr. Rogers, undoubtably has touched more of our lives than most ever have. Fred Rogers was an ordained Presbyterian Minister of Word and Sacrament, but instead of serving in congregations, his ministry was his show. He was a rare preacher who spread God's deep love for everyone, and embodied a sense of God's peace and reconciliation for millions of children and adults in a way that was invitational for everybody. He truly lived into that wonderful saying attributed to Saint Francis – "preach the gospel at all times. Use words if necessary."

Our denomination honors Rev. Rogers with a Mr. Rogers day on his birthday, March 20th. This falls during the Lenten season, so we didn't recognize it then, but now that it is summer, and our days in our neighborhood will likely be beautiful, if a little warm, we will celebrate his ministry together in mid July with our first Neighbor Days.

We are also, using Mr. Rogers as a theme, starting up a VBS for the first time in years.

On Saturday, July 15th, we will hold a family-centered, intergenerational VBS for everybody. Bring your kids! Bring your adults! Let us come together and learn and play in the spirit of Mr. Rogers. We will have offerings for kids of all ages and adults as well.

Then, on Sunday, July 16th, we will continue our Neighbor Days with a worship service highlighting our denomination's Mr. Rogers Emphasis Day. We are still planning this out, but we will look to do some mission together that day for our neighbors too.

We will invite our neighbors to join us for this weekend of being neighborly. I hope you will grab your sneakers, and your sweaters... if it's unseasonably cool, and work on your singing "Won't You Be My Neighbor."


Who are we?


Who is God calling us to be?

8 Habits

This summer I will be preaching a series on our denomination's new resource, "The 8 Habits of Evangelism." As Ray Jones III, director of our Office of Theology, Formation, and Evangelism writes of these 8 habits:

The following habits develop within us a love of God, neighbor and Creation: prayer, generosity, sacraments, worship, teaching, justice, fellowship and radical welcome. Over time these habits change us and offer discernment and guidance for following Jesus through the trials, structures and systems of our nation and world. These habits enable us to hear God's voice over all the other voices calling out to be heard. These habits cause our hearts to break over and open to the needs of and hurt in people around us. These habits provide the words of good news to which we bear witness and proclaim. By the power of the Holy Spirit, these habits enable us to lay down our lives so that others can live.

Evangelism in the 21st century North American context must be experienced as a journey of going deeper in our faith, relationships around us and God's mission of rescue and reconciliation. This journey of faith engages formation habits that change our lives and the world around us. When we open ourselves to God's love, justice and the people around us, we encounter the reconciliation of all things and the saving grace of Jesus. The beauty of this journey is that this transformation process always opens us to the wonder of God. And along the journey we realize that all people can breathe. Oh my, all people breathing the breath of God! Now that's a story worth living and telling.

Story Behind the Hymn: Holy! Holy! Holy!

As we celebrate Trinity Sunday on June 4, let's take a look at one of the most well-known and beloved hymns of our faith.

Holy! Holy! Holy! speaks of the power of the Holy Trinity. The opening phrase, "Holy! Holy! Holy! Lord God of Hosts", is a direct English translation of the Sanctus, which is found in the Latin Mass. The words found in the hymn are a paraphrase of Revelation 4:1-11. *Holy! Holy! Holy!* was written by Reginald Heber.

Reginald Heber was born in 1783 to a wealthy, educated family. By the age of seven, he was translating Latin Classics into English verse. He entered Oxford at age 17 and won two awards for poetry during his time at University. Heber became rector of his father's church near Shrewsbury, England. He remained there for sixteen years. He longed to improve the singing of his little congregation at Hodnet. During his time there he began writing songs. Heber wrote over 57 hymns over the course of his career.

While working at the little church in Hodnet, Heber also served on staff of a literary journal. He is said to have been impressed by the holiness of God and often wrote the words "Only Thou Art Holy." His lyrics for *Holy! Holy! Holy!* are drawn from Revelation 4:8. He was the first to compile a hymnal ordering hymns around the church calendar.

Holy! Holy! Holy! was written for Trinity Sunday. Trinity Sunday is one week after Pentecost Sunday. This is evidenced by "God in three persons, blessed Trinity," which is found in the first and last verses.

He uses other symbolism such as God is "perfect in power, in love and purity;" God is worshiped by saints, cherubim, and seraphim; and God is praised "in earth and sky and sea," and God is "holy, merciful and mighty." Heber had a deep fondness for India, and in 1823, he was appointed Bishop of Calcutta. The primitive conditions, duties of the position as Bishop and hot climate took a toll on his health.

Heber died on April 3, 1826, just three years after he began to serve the people of India. He was only 43 years old. Many of his admirers raised over 10,000 pounds to support his widow and children. After Heber's death, his widow came across the words to *Holy! Holy! Holy!* However, it took more than three decades before the poem became a song and took its place in numerous worship services.

The hymn has been recorded by numerous artists and was sung in the 1953 film version of *Titanic*. Famed poet Alfred Lord Tennyson felt *Holy! Holy! Holy!* was the "world's greatest hymn."
